

Honored by the Interfaith Community

A longtime pastor of the Eastern Diocese, he received a special honor from the Racine Interfaith Coalition (RIC), for his lifelong ministry, and his advocacy of justice and compassion.

Der Yeprem Kelegian was bestowed with RIC's annual "Outstanding Community Service Award," in a ceremony on February 8, in Racine, WI. The award citation expressed gratitude and love to Fr. Yeprem, praising his "years of service as the leader of our vigils, activities, and celebrations," and acknowledging him as "the true conscience of our mission in the Racine community."

RIC is a collaboration of 28 faith communities working together in the region in various social outreach, educational, and civic causes. Among its members is our Diocesan parish in Racine, St. Mesrob Church, where Der Yeprem served before his retirement.

Said Der Yeprem "I was humbled and surprised by the honor, but in accepting it, I gave thanks to all the other people for the incredible work **they** do because **they** are the church."

SUSAN LIND-SINANIAN passed away peacefully on April 5, 2025 at Mt. Auburn Hospital.

Susan Marie Sinanian was born in Boston, Massachusetts on November 3, 1948 to the late Harry Sinanian and Margaret (Samourian) Sinanian, and was the sister of Janet Rae-

Sinanian, Marilyn Sinanian Stuart, and Paul Sinanian.

Susan was a graduate of Boston Girl's Latin School, Northeastern University, and Boston College, with a BS in Elementary Education and an MEd in Education of the Visually Impaired. She worked as a house mother at the Perkin's School for the Blind while a student at Northeastern and upon graduation, joined the staff at Perkins, teaching Daily Living Skills at the Keller-Sullivan Building for 42 years, guiding generations of blind students.

Teaching was one of her greatest loves. The other was embracing and sharing her Armenian heritage. Susan was also a noted expert in traditional Armenian folk arts and lectured and taught workshops on Armenian village dances, folk embroideries and costumes, and cooking at camps throughout the United States and in Europe and Asia. She learned these arts through interviews with survivors of the Armenian Genocide. For 39 years Susan also served as the Textile Curator/Conservator of the Armenian Museum of America, where in 1986 she created the textile center to oversee the largest Armenian textile collection in the diaspora. She created numerous exhibitions on costumes, laces, embroideries, and carpets, both at the Armenian Museum and off-site.

She assisted Ron Marchese and Marlene Breu at the Armenian Patriarchate in Istanbul, advising the conservation and preparation of historic vestments for a new museum there, and advised in the creation of a museum in Shushi, Artsakh. She presented Armenian culture at a Smithsonian Festival in Washington, and in 2015 she curated an Armenian textile exhibit at the United Nations in New York, which is currently on view at the Armenian Museum of America in Watertown. Susan was an active lecturer, performer, and teacher until health issues curtailed her activities, but in recent years she still managed to participate in the documentation of Armenian dance for the Houshamadyan website and demonstrated embroideries on the website of the Armenian Museum.



Susan was married to Gary Lind-Sinanan, the Collections Curator of the Armenian Museum, for 48 years. They met in a Lebanese Dance group and together taught Lebanese, Assyrian, and Armenian dances in international folk circles. Susan is survived by her husband Gary, her son and daughter-in-law Raffi and Heidi Kaivalya, her siblings Janet, Marilyn and Paul, and numerous nephews and nieces.

We are deeply saddened to share the passing of Susan Lind-Sinanian, a beloved member of the Armenian Museum of America family, on April 5. Born in Boston in 1948, Susan was a passionate educator, cultural ambassador, and expert in Armenian folk arts.

For 42 years, Susan taught at the Perkins School for the Blind, guiding generations of blind students. Her love for teaching extended beyond the classroom, as she embraced and shared her Armenian

heritage through lectures, work-

shops, and exhibitions.

Susan was the Textile Curator/Conservator at the Armenian Museum of America, where she oversaw the largest textile collection in the Armenian Diaspora. Susan lectured and taught workshops

on Armenian village dances, folk embroideries and costumes. She learned these arts through interviews with survivors of the Armenian Genocide.

ARMENIAN CYMBAL MAKER - ZILDJIAN

Avedis Zildjian was an Armenian alchemist and metalsmith who founded the Zildjian Company, the world's oldest and most renowned manufacturer of cymbals. Born in Constantinople (modern-day Istanbul), Avedis discovered a secret alloy that produced a unique sound, blending durability and musicality. Initially intended for military use, these cymbals gained immense popularity among musicians, leading Avedis to shift his focus to music.

In 1623, he established the Zildjian Company, which became synonymous with high-quality percussion instruments. The name "Zildjian" itself means "cymbalsmith" in Armenian. Over the centuries, the company has remained a family-owned business, crafting cymbals that are iconic in the music world, used by legendary drummers and orchestras. Avedis Zildjian's legacy lives on as a symbol of Armenian ingenuity and global cultural impact.



New York community advocate ANTRANIK BOUDAKIAN to be honored with ANCA Eastern Region VAHAN CARDASHIAN AWARD

Lifelong Hai Tahd activist and Armenian community leader Antranik Boudakian will be honored with the Vahan Cardashian Award (Vahan is a cousin of our Vahram Kardashian, the main founder of



ACOM and the driving force bringing St. Sahag Church to the Twin Cities) at the ANCA Eastern Region (ANCA-ER) Endowment Fund 18th Annual Gala on October 19, 2024. The gala, which will bring together hundreds of Armenian activists and friends to celebrate the accomplishments of the ANCA-ER, will include an open bar cocktail recep-

tion, a curated silent auction with one-of-a-kind items from the homeland and an awards program accompanied by a seated dinner.

The Vahan Cardashian Award is presented annually to a supporter of the ANCA-ER who demonstrates sustained commitment and involvement in the Armenian American community and its issues. Boudakian will join a long list of ANC activists previously recognized with this award, including Ken Sarajian, Barkev Kaligian, Joseph Dagdgian and Andrew Kzirian.

Boudakian, a child of Armenian Genocide survivors and lifelong member of the Armenian Revolutionary Federation (ARF), was born and raised in Aleppo, Syria, alongside his brother Krikor and sister Zabel. He attended Haigazian Elementary School with tuition support from the Armenian Prelacy and the Armenian Relief Society. In 1964, he moved to New York, where he married his wife Marion Marashlian, to whom he has been married for 59 years. Together they have three children, Gregory, Liza and Seta, and eight grandchildren. He is the owner of Lorilil Jewelers in Forest Hills, New York.

Boudakian has been instrumental in advancing Armenian causes through New York politics. For years, Boudakian has hosted fundraising events for local pro-Armenian politicians, including members of the U.S. Congress, the mayor and borough president, at his home in Queens. Boudakian was awarded the "Knights of Cilicia" medal by the Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia for his years of service raising funds for the Armenian Prelacy and encouraging local involvement in the church. He was also the New York sales ambassador for the ACAA Armenian Heritage Cruise for two decades and has supported ARF and Armenian Youth Federation programs.

"The ANCA is the best hope we have of helping Armenia from the United States. Seeing new generations of activists stepping up to continue the work gives me so much joy and encouragement. I am relieved to see that the Hai Tahd will never die," Boudakian said.



- 4) To provide periodic gatherings and meetings for the cultural furtherance of the Armenian people, their relations and friends who have an interest in Armenian culture within the general Minnesota area.

CONSTITUTION

The Armenian Cultural Organization of Minnesota (ACOM) preserves and promotes Armenian culture, language, history and heritage in Minnesota and the upper Midwest. Founded in 1980 and headquartered in St. Paul, ACOM is the oldest and largest Armenian organization in the state.

ACOM welcomes everyone, regardless of ethnic, religious, or political affiliation, who takes an interest in Armenia and Armenians. Our members include first-generation through fourth-generation Minnesota Armenians, their families, and non-Armenian friends of the community.

ACOM's numerous cultural and social events include Armenian dance parties (Gaghant), guest speakers, folk dance lessons and performances by the Armenian Dance Ensemble of Minnesota, Genocide commemorations, summer picnics, and series of Interviews of Presenters talking about their heritage. ACOM also sponsors all Armenian activities at the International Institute's Festival of Nations, a major regional folk festival held annually in St. Paul. Minnesota Armenians were founding participants in 1932; today, the Festival is ACOM's most visible public venue.

As an independent, 501 (c)3 non-profit organization, ACOM is supported primarily by membership dues and private donations. Gifts to ACOM are tax-deductible to the extent permissible by law.
